Good morning on this Fry-day.

Even if you don't consider yourself a gamer, you've probably heard about Pokémon Go.

The game can be a great way to tour New York City. (<u>Here are some suggestions</u> on making the most of it.)

But it isn't the only outdoor game in town.

On Friday and Saturday in Times Square, you can play games created by students at Magnet, the Media and Games Network, at New York University.

They were designed for Times Square's multilingual and multicultural audience, and they take into account the unique challenges of the crossroads of the world.

(Basically, simple instructions and engaging gameplay.)

Here are a few on offer:

• Race through Times Square using high-fives from passers-by to escape separated zones in "High5Zone."

• "Prom Game" asks strangers to get to know one another using love tests during quick one-on-one interactions.

• Navigate Times Square with instructions provided through headphones, while others do the same, in "Museum of Missed Connections."

• Or try "Subway Chaos," in which players navigate colored lines while overcoming unforeseen roadblocks.

(Sounds just like our morning commute.)

The games, free to play, are on the Broadway plazas between 42nd and 45th Streets.

Or go old school this weekend:

A board game social is at Bryant Park at 6 p.m. [Free]

Learn to play chess at Pier 6 in Brooklyn Bridge Park on Sunday. [Free]

Play table tennis at <u>Tompkins Square Park</u> or <u>Luther Gulick Park</u> in Manhattan. [Free, bring your own paddle]

Or pick up a game of miniature golf at Pier 25 in TriBeCa. [\$5]
